A Coup in the Coop?

I had occasion this summer to again witness the great healing powers of the DYNAMITE® products, this time on fowl.

I have been raising a flock of Blue Slate Turkeys, a rare breed, for Thanksgiving. One day during the hottest and driest part of the summer, I found one of the turkeys comatose in the pen with the back of his head bloodied. I was surprised and upset since I hadn't seen this problem before when raising turkeys. I brought the injured bird in and immediately washed the back of his head with water and DYNAMITE® All-Natural Shampoo.

He had a hole about 2" in diameter in which I could see ligaments, so I wasn't optimistic about his chances for recovery. I dropped Trace Mineral Concentrate into the hole then applied Wound Salve over the entire injury area as well as packing the hole with it. I put the turkey in a protected house with water and food. I top-
